Questions and Answers

Q. When was the Animal Ordinance adopted?

A. The Animal ordinance was first adopted in September 2001 and has since been amended several times, usually in response to changes in state law. We adopted this ordinance a few months after I took office and it was in response to a horrific dog attack on a child in Union County. With the help of a volun-

Q & A from Union teer committee at the time, we were able to come up with a very good ordinance County that has stood the test of time, with just a few adjustments. Q. What is considered a "dangerous" dog?

A. As defined in the ordinance, a dangerous dog is any dog that: · Causes a substantial puncture of a person's skin by teeth

without causing serious injury; provided, however, that a nip, scratch, or abrasion shall not be sufficient to classify a dog as dangerous under Aggressively attacks in a manner that causes a person to reasonably believe that the dog posed an imminent threat of serious

injury to a person although no such injury occurs; provided, however, that the acts of barking, growling, or showing of teeth by a dog shall not be sufficient to classify a dog as dangerous under this paragraph.

While off the owner's property, kills a pet animal;

Q. What is considered a "vicious" dog? A. A vicious dog means a dog that inflicts serious injury or

death on a person or causes serious injury to a person resulting from reasonable attempts to escape from the dog's attack or is owned, possessed, kept, harbored, trained, or maintained for the purpose of fight-Q. Who determines if a dog is dangerous or vicious?

A. The animal control officer will make such investigations and inquiries as may be necessary to identify and classify dangerous

Q. What happens after a dog is declared dangerous or vi-

A. When a dangerous or vicious dog is classified as such by the animal control officer, the officer will notify the owner in writing within 72 hours of such classification. The notice will include a form to request a hearing. The owners of the dogs classified as dangerous and vicious will be expected to be issued citations for nuisance and/or failure to exercise reasonable care. The animal control officer may also immediately impound the dog pending compliance with this



Dear Editor,

Those boys in the House of Representatives down at the Capitol are at it again. Give with one hand and take away with the other. There is nothing like confusion and discord by those boys and girls to get the voters to believe they are doing the people a service while stripping their pocketbook of more money. Waste and folly is the national past time for Georgia politicians, both local and state level.

Presently Georgia's Tax on a gallon of gas is 27.5 cents per gallon, made up from 7.5 cents excise tax, add in 20 cents of other State taxes, including Local option taxes anywhere from 2 to four cents per gallon. Add in the Federal tax of 18 cents per gallon and the total is approx. 45.5 cents of tax per gallon of gas.

Through the "Transportation Funding Act of 2015" (TFA), the Georgia House wants to do away with local taxes on a gallon of gas, increase the State excise tax to 29.5 cents per gallon from the present 7.5 cents. This while doing nothing to the other 17 cents per gallon. One must keep the slush funds full.

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
A Pinch of Chalk
