## GDOT: 'Ivy Log Creek Bridge to be replaced'

Ivy Log Creek Bridge, built in 1940, is about to be replaced, according to the Georgia Department of Transportation.

The Murphy Highway bridge project is part of a \$55 million improvement package approved last week by GDOT, department spokesperson Teri Pope said.

The new bridge in Union County is one of 17 North Georgia projects awarded by GDOT last week, Pope said.

The North Georgia projects cost total \$55 million, Pope said.

"The projects will improve mobility and safety," Pope said.

Talley Construction Company of Rossville, was awarded the bid for the .474-

mile long Ivy Log Creek Bridge project. Total construction cost: \$3.578 million, Pope said.

Construction on the bridge is expected to begin later this summer, with a target completion date of Dec. 31, 2014, Pope said.

Emily Dunn, who represents the 9th Congressional District, which includes Union County, said construction of the Ivy Log Creek Bridge is exciting news for Union County residents.

"This is great news for our community and construction will not impact traffic," Dunn said. "The new bridge

will be built parallel to the existing bridge to the west. Traffic will continue to use the existing structure until the new bridge is finished then traffic will be shifted over to use the new bridge and the original bridge will be demolished."

The existing bridge was built in 1940. The new structure will include shoulders on both sides of the bridge and be built to current engineering standards improving safety for motorists, Pope said.

Work on the project is expected to begin late this summer.

Union County Sole Commissioner Lamar Paris was all smiles about the Ivy Log Creek Bridge project. He praised GDOT's leadership team.

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
Brian Jordan has always been a game-changer.

Today, he's changing the writing game in children's books. When you think of a children's book author, you might not automatically think of the former Atlanta two-sport professional athlete. However, he's authored three children's books.

Thomas was in Blairsville on Friday at the Union County Public Library showcasing just what the mobile unit has to offer.

The mobile units are equipped with video technol-

"This is the first of many trips to Blairsville," Thomas said. "We'll be here, once or twice a month, or as often as

necessary. We're still working on a schedule, so we'll get that information to you as soon as it's complete."

The mobile units are being used in each of the Georgia Mountains Regional Commission's 13 counties to provide a resource for the unemployed and underemployed to access needed technology in their pursuit of employment, Thomas said.

## Mason: 'two charged in drug busts'

A stuck vehicle landed a 63-year-old Norcross man stuck in the Union County Jail following a call for assistance last week, Union County Sheriff Mack Mason said.

Tommy Michael Brown's 2011 Shelby Cobra Mustang was stuck in a ditch near Highway 515 East and the U.S. Forest Service building, Sheriff Mason said.

"Deputy Sally Tanner responded to the call for help," Sheriff Mason said. "While talking with Mr.

Brown, Sally observed several smoking devices inside the vehicle which are known to be used to smoke illegal narcotics.

"Deputy Tanner then spoke to Mr. Brown about the

smoking devices and asked for his consent to search the vehicle and he declined," Sheriff Mason said.

That led to Union County Sheriff's Investigator Tyler Miller's involvement in the matter, Sheriff Mason said.

"After being denied consent to search the vehicle, Deputy Tanner contacted Tyler Miller to respond to the scene," Sheriff Mason said. "As Deputy Tanner was waiting on Miller's arrival, Mr. Brown told her that he had some synthetic marijuana inside the vehicle." Investigator Miller soon ar-
