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Summer League Softball: Union blasts Towns

However, Coach Stewart and company can breath a sigh of relief now that the players who have dominated the youth softball leagues and the middle school for the past three years have now begun to crack the high school ranks.

"Losing five seniors and gaining several freshman this summer, we're focused on playing together as a team and improving on our fundamentals in the field and at the plate,' Stewart said.

Last week's Summer League wins over Towns County showed that Union County will be young and inexperienced during the upcoming season, but has no shortage of talent. If teams across Region 8-AA want to knock Union County from the top of the mountain, they better get their shots in early, because Lady Panther softball has nowhere to go but up once the season opens on Aug. 9th.

During Union's sweep of Towns, the Lady Panthers jumped out to a 10-0 lead in the first inning as Union sent 15 hitters to the plate in the bottom of the first.

Crystal Busbee pitched a shutout in a mercy-rule shortened game. The junior also drove in four runs and scored twice in the first inning after being hit by a pitch and then smacking a 2-RBI single to left the second time around.

According to McCombs, when opportunity knocked last week, he had plenty of guys who were eager to answer.


