

Track: Men's 4x100 closes 2024 as State Runner-Up

UCHS collects four top-five finishes at Class AA State Championships

Nicholson - The Union County men's 4x100 relay team of Jonah Kluth, JT Neal, Tyler Parker and Taylor Whitehead turned in the second-fastest time in Class AA during last weekend's State Championships at East Jackson High School.

After logging the fastest time during Thursday's prelims (42.44), the 4x100 team clocked in at 42.57 on Saturday. Meanwhile, their runner-up finish marks UCHS' best state performance since 2019 – Zoe Sanchez's 3200M State title.

Drew Charter took home first in the 4x100 at 42.26, and Landmark Christian placed third at 42.92.

In other events, Whitehead placed fourth in the 200M race with a time of 21.65, trailing third-place Christopher Swint (21.61) of Davidson Fine Arts, runner-up Simeon Adams (21.43) of Drew Charter and winner Austin McGee (21.38) of Athens Academy.

McGee took home the State title in the 100M event, where Whitehead (10.86) placed fifth, with a time of 10.55. Adams came in second at 10.58, Booker T. Washington's Kamren Warren (10.64) was third and Swint (10.79) placed fourth. Neal finished in eighth place at 10.97.

On the girls' side, Lola Hunter came in fifth in the 3200M race with a time of 11:44.44. Athens Academy's Maya Davis took home gold

This includes use of the splash pad, pool, and 2 lifeguards for up to 40 people in the water. You must pay a non-refundable fee of \$25 the day you book your party. Parties are Tuesday, Thursday, Friday, Saturday, and Sunday from 6:30 p.m. - 8:30 p.m. be-ginning, 6/1 and ending 8/6 then only weekends 8/10, 8/11, 8/17, 8/18, 8/24, 8/25.

Spring Football: Dockrey handed keys to Panthers' new-look offense

Union County football answered its biggest question during spring practice, but more remain as the Panthers prepare for summer workouts ahead of the Aug. 16 season opener at Gilmer.

Rising junior Cade Dockrey enters the summer at QB-1 after triumphing in the spring quarterback battle over rising sophomore Chetley Cox and rising freshman Kamden Kendrick.

"Cade is going to run the show," Union County head coach Michael Perry said. "That's not a knock on Chetley, but Cade is so dynamic in the run game that he's going to really help our offense. He did a lot of good things for us in the spring but we still have a long way to go."

However, Coach Perry added he expects Cox to be a significant contributor this fall on both sides of the ball at wide receiver and safety.

As for the offense, expect some changes in personnel and schemes this fall following heavy graduation losses at the skill positions. Panther fans will no longer see the nohuddle, hurry-up offense that lit up north Georgia scoreboards over the last 20 years as Union County embraces a more conservative approach.

"It's going to look a lot different compared to what we've been," Perry said. "We're going to have a lot of guys playing both ways, so offensively, we're going to be huddling and running the clock. We're going to be a run-first

offense. If everyone is healthy, you can expect a lot more multiple backs and multiple tight end sets. We're just trying to get our best guys on the field."

Rising senior Connor Schuknecht will handle the bulk of the carries in the backfield, along with rising sophomore Bentley Rich, who stood out during the spring.

"Bentley had a very good spring, he showed a lot of maturity and did some good things for us," Perry said. "Connor will get most of the snaps at running back with Bentley backing him up."

Additionally, the em-

phasis on the ground attack stems from a talented O-line. which Perry complimented as a strength of the offensive unit.

The Panthers return three starters up front, led by all-region guard and rising senior Kaden Combs. Union also returns its two freshman tackles from its 2023 Sweet 16 run, Easton Shumaker and Jaxon Totherow. Rising junior Kye Burnett saw a few spot starts in 2023, as did rising senior Beau Webster. Unfortunately, Webster is dealing with a knee injury that places his 2024 status in limbo.

Others vying for playing

time in the trenches are rising sophomore Alex Godinez and rising junior Trent Webster.

The Panthers might not air it out as much this fall, but that doesn't mean there aren't potential game breakers on the outside

Rising senior Maddox Young showed out during the spring after returning to the football program. Rising junior Tyler Parker will take on a larger role after catching four passes for 75 yards and a TD last fall.

The void at the tight end spot, previously manned by Tyler Grasty, could be filled

by rising seniors Dusty Aaron and Ethan Lester, who will play both ways after their breakout 2023 defensive seasons. But Aaron suffered a knee injury in the spring that could cost him some prep time this summer, and Lester is still recovering from a pair of injuries suffered

last November at Rockmart. Elsewhere on defense, Perry expects Combs, Shumaker and Totherow to fill in the gaps on the D-line and at linebacker.

"I'm really proud of those guys," he said. "They played both ways [this spring], and I know they aren't used to that. But like I said, we're trying to get the best guys on the field."

Combs and Shumaker are the favorites to take over as the inside linebackers. Lester and Schuknecht are both returning starters and will play on the outside. Rich is also competing for playing time at outside linebacker, as is returning safety Braden Plott.

"Braden is going to start, obviously," Perry said. "We just don't know if it's going to be at safety or linebacker, but right now, it looks like linebacker.

'Connor and Bentley will play the other outside linebacker because they are kind of the same player," he continued. "So if Connor is gassed, Bentley will be ready to go."

With Dockrey moving to quarterback, the Panthers lose an all-region safety in their secondary, and Perry made it crystal clear his signal caller will not see any action on the defensive side.

'Our quarterback is the one guy that will not play both ways," he said.

Rising junior Daniel McPhee and rising sophomore Paxon Legatt lead the way at cornerback, while Cox, Young and rising senior Carter Deal compete for the safety positions

On special teams, rising sophomore Grant Smith is the current front-runner to handle kicking duties.

The Panthers are off for the remainder of May before returning to the field in June. Union County begins its summer 7-on-7 sessions by hosting Andrews, NC on June 6.

Track and Field: Taylor Whitehead takes two UCHS records to Reinhardt

Union County track-andfield star Taylor Whitehead, the 100M and 200M school record holder, signed with Waleska's Reinhardt University on Tuesday, April 30.

Whitehead is coming off a remarkable 2024 senior season where he earned three top-five finishes at the Class AA State Championships, including a runner-up performance as the third leg of Union's 4x100relay team.

And in a sport where speed and success are synonymous, Reinhardt's promptness proved vital in landing Whitehead.

"Reinhardt was the first to reach out [to me], and I really appreciated that," he said. "I took a few visits and they took me in really quick. They knew I could fit in somewhere on the team and I really trust their coaching. They are a super good track program in the NAIA division, and I'm excited about what they can do to help me grow as an athlete.

According to Whitehead, Reinhardt expects him to compete in the 100M, 200M, 4x100 and 4x400 events.

"I recruited him [to track], and since his sophomore year, his 200 times have dropped from 25.2 seconds to 22.9 last year and 21.7 [this year]," McBride said.
