Flooding Dangers

We have all seen the flooding devastation that happened in Texas. There has been over 100 dead and even more missing. The Search and Rescue effort continues. We have seen the power and the dangers of the moving water and flooding. Flooding is the most common natural disaster in the United States and is the second leading cause of weather-related death.

Flood Safety Preparedness Week was in March and we provided

some information on flooding risks and some effective safety strategies. The first was Flood Safety and Awareness. This is staying informed and paying attention to watches and warnings. It also involves creating a



plan, building a ready kit, and communicating with your family so you're prepared in case of a flood.

The best practice is to be prepared to move to higher ground if floodwaters are rising near you. Once you see that the streams, creeks, or rivers start to quickly rise, it is time to move or at least prepare to move. Have a plan on where to go, how to get there, and to take a route that does not cross or come near rising water. Have your ready kit available and make sure that everyone knows the plan of action.

The theme of "Turn Around, Don't Drown" warns people to never attempt to drive through floodwaters. Two feet of moving water can carry away a full-sized car. Drivers cannot tell if the roadway covered with water is stable and safe. Roadways could be washed away or damaged. It may appear safe but the additional weight of a car can cause a collapse of the road. The best practice is to not drive through the floodwater.

Walking through floodwater can be just as dangerous. Most floodwater is filled with debris and mud making it difficult to see the bottom. A person may not know that they are walking off a riverbank or into a ditch that can be several feet deep. Moving water is powerful and it takes only six inches of moving water to knock you off your feet. Once you are off your feet, you are at the mercy of the moving water.

Floodwater is dangerous, and most people do not understand the power of floodwater until it is too late. It is best to avoid floodwater altogether and move to high ground. Stay safe and remember

The Hubris That **Could Destroy America** Dear Editor,

We mountain folks know a thing or two about pride. There's the good kind - taking pride in an honest day's work, in raising your kids right, in flying the flag out front of the house. And then there's the bad kind – hubris. That's the old Greek word for the kind of pride that turns into arrogance, the kind that makes a man think he's above the rules of God and nature. In every old story, hubris ends the same way: with a fall.

I see a lot of hubris these days in the loudest voices in our politics. Folks chanting "Make America Great Again" seem to think they alone know what America is and how to fix it. They talk like they own patriotism, like faith and freedom are theirs alone. They sneer at teachers, scientists, judges, and even pastors who don't toe their line. They think waving a flag is enough,

Converging on Truth

On his podcast, Justin Brierley has conversations with people who tell interesting stories about their spiritual journeys. It's the story, the process that interests him more than anyone's fame.

A British chap, Mark Baldwin, was one such guest. Baldwin's philosophy had centered on three aspects of reality. He

believed in a First Cause, "but not an entity you could pray to." Second, he embraced Greek philosophy the Logos-Sophia (word-wisdom) "through which reality is held together and made intelligible." His third belief was in meditation, "a sense of communing with something.



Everybody has one...

One day Baldwin began reading the gospel of John looking for ways to disprove its authenticity. He was aware that John, speaking to a culture influenced by Greek philosophy, used "Logos" or Word to describe Jesus as the center of reality. His reading introduced the possibility of a relationship with the Logos, challenging his prior beliefs. This speaks of Jesus: "The Word became flesh and dwelt among us" (John 1:14). This began to change Baldwin's thinking.

Baldwin had come to understand by philosophy that an intelligence, a reality, precedes the material universe. This is not unlike the conclusion reached by theoretical physicist John Wheeler. Wheeler published in the fields of general relativity, nuclear fission, and quantum information. In 1990, 58 years after earning a PhD, he caused quite a stir in the scientific community. He published a report showing that something had to exist before the material universe. "Every physical quantity, every it, derives its ultimate significance from bits," he wrote. "It from bit symbolizes the idea that every item of the physical world has at bottom an immaterial source and explanation." In other words, there must be a Logos. Yet again, science arrives at a place where the Bible has been all along. "In the beginning was the Word (Logos)... and the Word was God. All things came into being through Him" (John 1:1,3).

The thought of personally knowing the Word captured Baldwin's imagination. One day while walking and meditating

From Your Commissioner

I've written several times about the Union County Farmers Market, but I've not written very much about the Cannery that is located on the same property. Just behind Building B at the Farmers Market is a large metal building. There you will find the local community cannery that was built for home/personal canning. The Union County Canning Plant is not certified for com-

mercial use, and products canned at the facility may not be sold. For 2025, the Union County Cannery is scheduled to open on July 15th and will be open Tuesdays and Thursdays from 7 AM – 1 PM but only by appointment. Demand for the use of the Cannery is great. Appointments can be made by



calling 706-439-6043. Appointments are scheduled in time slots of 7 AM-9:45 AM and 10 AM-12:45 PM. The cannery charges 50ϕ per pint and 50ϕ per quart.

Here's how it works:

a) Schedule your day/time by calling the Canning Plant.

b) Visitors wishing to can fruits and vegetables should bring jars, lids, bands, products to be canned and all necessary ingredients needed for the canning recipe. The Cannery does have some bowls, knives, measuring cups, spoons, funnels, etc., but you are encouraged to bring your own.

c) Upon arrival on your scheduled day/time, complete the 2025 Registration Form. The first time you sign in, you will be assigned a number. You will use the same number each time you visit during the same year. You may then go to your assigned table and begin preparing your product. If your product needs steaming/ cooking, please let a staff member know so they can cook/steam your product and return it to you.

d) You will place your jars upside down in small baskets for sterilization. Staff members will sterilize and return jars to you. You will write your registration number on the lids with a sharpie and then immerse your lids in hot water. You will then place your product in the hot jars, put lids/bands on the jars, and signal a staff member. Your jars will be processed for you.

e) Clean the table and any Canning Plant equipment used before leaving. Take your personal things with you. Return after the designated time to pick up and pay for your product. Place

Moral Society

The Heartbeat of a Moral Society

Responsibility for others sits at the heart of any moral society. Yet for many Americans today, this principle feels increasingly endangered. According to a Gallup Poll from last year, 78% of respondents

believe that morals are getting worse in the United States. When asked to identify the nation's greatest moral failing, a "lack of consideration for others" topped the list by more



The consequences are not abstract. Stories of loneliness, family breakdown, and neighbors isolated from one another fill our newsfeeds and conversations. The U.S. Surgeon General recently declared loneliness and social disconnection a public health crisis. In times of crisis - whether during natural disasters or pandemic lockdowns - there are countless examples of people stepping up for one another. Yet, just as often, we hear of individuals suffering alone, or communi-

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and experiencing new things. However, during his early years life was much more difficult. Traveling was particularly difficult. During WWII

Papa was actively engaged in farming. So, the Draft Board skipped over him when his number came up. He was told the country needed his cotton more than his person. He was at home; however, things were extremely difficult for the young family during the winters.

So, after the cotton was harvested in early October Papa hitched a ride to Phil Campbell where he caught a train to Miami, Florida. Papa's older brother, Pickens, secured a job for him milking cows on a large dairy just north of Miami. He worked for just over one month when he received word that his youngest son, Bud, was sick with the pneumonia. It was difficult to even send a message in those days. Granny had to send a relative 20 miles to Russellville where the nearest phone was located. That relative called the operator in Miami. The operator found someone to take the message out to Papa at the dairy where he worked.

He had very little money because it was being sent home to Granny and his two sons. So, he had to hitchhike his way from Miami to Phil Campbell. It took more than a week. By the time he got home Bud was much better and recovering. Papa vowed to never leave his family alone again. He said, "We always had plenty of food. We just never had any money.'

Papa also worked harder than I ever thought about. He owned a 300-acre farm in North Alabama that he cleared by hand. The whole farm was in trees when he purchased the land. My grandparents cut the trees with a cross cut saw. Then they plowed around the stumps and planted their crops. The stumps all rotted in about 7 years, after which they had a field. Now, I think I am working when I use a weedeater or when I ride my mower for a few hours. I know that our generation has it much better than Papa's generation.

During his early years he raised his own food. If he didn't raise it the family didn't eat it. He grew and butchered his own hogs. He didn't eat beef regularly until the 1950's when they hooked up to the TVA lines and was able to get a freezer. The most exotic food he ever See Cummings, page 5A

as adults. A common myth about chiggers is that they burrow into your skin. Chiggers do not burrow under the skin. They bite and release a chemical into your



skin that kills cells. This turns the cells around the bite into a kind of slurpee that the chigger drinks. It is also incredibly irritating to the person that has been bit. Chiggers like tall grass, and brush. They tend to stay away from resting in the sun, because they will dry out. If you have walked through an area that looks like it could have chiggers the best thing is to go inside, change clothes, and wash yourself off with warm, soapy water.

Ticks are also technically not insects because they have eight legs. Baby ticks are born and start climbing up anything that is nearby (grass, sticks, brush). They are hoping that a passerby will brush against whatever they are hanging onto, and they will get a free ride and a blood meal. If they find a suitable host, they will latch on and start feeding. Ticks can carry diseases like Lyme disease and Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever. Lyme disease is most common in the northeast, Midwest, and mid-Atlantic regions. Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever is most commonly found in southeastern states. It is not possible to tell if a tick is carrying the bacteria to cause disease. However, certain species of ticks are known to be more likely to carry disease than others, and it is possible to identify tick species.

Some nights in the summer time it seems like there are enough mosquitoes out there to carry you away. Like ticks and chiggers, mosquitoes don't like spots that are hot and dry, because their body will dry out quickly. Therefore, mosquitoes tend to come out at night. Mosquitoes tend to like areas with lots of moisture and still water. Shrubs and bushes provide cover for them to hide during the day.

For any of these pesky bugs the best way to try and get rid of them is to keep grass cut short and keep debris away from your house. If you are spending time outside, using an effective repellent is a good idea. Products containing DEET, oil of lemon eucalyptus, picaridin, permethrin, and catnip oil are all capable of repelling or killing mosquitoes, chiggers, and ticks. Another thing you can do is tuck your pants into your socks when hiking. This makes it harder for chiggers and ticks to hold on.

ate was squirrel. Papa never had pizza until he was about 35 years old.

I can remember my family raising their own hogs for processing into varied cuts for consumption later in the winter and spring. But, first the hogs had to be raised. A couple of sows were kept for breeding purposes. From these we usually kept four to feed out. The excess pigs were sold as feeder pigs. When the young shoates reached 40 pounds they were castrated and dewormed. Papa, Uncle Bud and Dad worked all the pigs on a summer day. To castrate the males a 50 gallon drum was used in which to place the young pigs in an upside down fashion. After all the males were treated Uncle Bud hollered out, "Okay Mick, you are next." I didn't want anything to do with those barrels and took off screaming toward the house.

After the pigs were treated we fed them for a time to fatten them up. Then the hogs were processed. My grandfather would dispatch his hogs quickly with a .22 caliber rifle. The hogs were then lifted off the ground with a hoist and the internal organs were removed. The hogs were then dunked into scalding water to help remove the hair. And all the fat was used to render into lard. Back in those days people depended upon fat from hogs. So, the fatter the hog the more desirable it was for people. They canned sausage. Then cured hams and bacon with salt and in the smokehouse. The tenderloin was kept whole to cut into slices to fry. The intestines were even used for chitlins or sausage casings. I know Papa's diet was high in fat and cholesterol. But, he farmed until 92 and died at 98.

The difference in his lifestyle and ours? Hard work and lots of exercise. All this hard work left little time for travel. Papa's life was pretty much limited to the geographic area of the Tennessee Valley. He never went overseas and only saw the beach one time during his life. However, his life was rich in the things I can only remember. Things which you and I are too busy to appreciate. I wonder what would happen today if we were forced to live as my Grandparents lived?

ties fracturing under pressure. The question for those who worry about moral decline is not just "What's wrong?" but "What can we do?"

The Torah offers profound wisdom through the contrasting examples of Noah and Abraham – two righteous men who faced a test of responsibility in eras of widespread corruption. Ten generations after Adam, G-d informed Noah of the coming destruction: "I've decided to put an end to humanity, for the earth is filled with robbery because of them, and I am destroying them from the earth. Make for yourself an ark..." (Genesis 6:13-14). Noah obeyed, spending 120 years building a massive ark, just as G-d commanded. According to tradition, the lengthy construction period was meant to provoke questions from passersby, giving Noah an opportunity to warn them and urge repentance. Yet, the record shows that Noah focused primarily on fulfilling his instructions and ensuring his family's safety. The result was that he survived the flood, but the rest of humanity perished an outcome the prophet Isaiah later alludes to as "the waters of Noah," hinting at his shared responsibility for his genera-

tion's fate. Abraham, by contrast, models a different kind of engagement. When G-d declared His intention to destroy Sodom and Gomorrah for their notorious cruelty and injustice, Abraham did not remain silent. He pleaded with G-d, asking, "Will You even destroy the righteous with the wicked? What if there are fifty righteous people in the city?" (Genesis 18:23-24). Abraham's negotiation continued, persistently seeking mercy not just for the righteous, but for the entire population - including those mired in wrongdoing. Though the cities were ultimately destroyed, Abraham's willingness to advocate for others - even the undeserving – was recognized and honored by G-d, who promised that "all nations on earth will be blessed through him" for pursuing charity and justice.

Noah fulfilled his obligations but remained separate, while Abraham embraced responsibility for others, regardless of their merits. In a time when moral standards are often seen as relative, and when public discourse can become harsh or indifferent, Abraham's example remains both challenging and necessary.

What does this look like in practice today? It may mean reaching out to a neighbor who lives alone, offering support to a family in crisis, or simply listening without judgment to someone struggling with addiction or anxiety. It could be seen in communities organizing meal trains for the sick, volunteers helping after a hurricane, or even the small, everyday acts of kindness that set a tone for others. These are not grand gestures reserved for the heroic or the holy, but simple expressions of the belief that every person is created in G-d's image and is therefore worthy of care

The call to responsibility is not about fixing the world single-handedly or rescuing everyone from their troubles. Rather, it is about refusing to turn away. It is about seeing the pain, confusion, or loneliness around us and choosing to respond – however mod-estly – with compassion and moral clarity. When we do so, we carry forward the legacy of Abraham, serving not only as protectors of our own families but as ambassadors of light and hope in a world hungry for both. At a time when many fear that morality is slipping away, the most effective response is to embody that responsibility in our own lives. The world changes when individuals choose to act - not out of convenience or social pressure, but out of a deep conviction that the well-being of others is, and always has been, our sacred concern. We don't need Greek philosophers to tell us what happens next. The Bible warns us plainly: Pride goeth before destruction, and a haughty spirit before a fall. We know it in our bones. A man who struts around thinking he's invincible will eventually meet the one thing he can't bully or lie his way past.

America is at a crossroads. We can choose humility - listening, learning, working together – or we can let hubris drive us off a cliff. MAGA's arrogance isn't strength; it's weakness dressed up in red hats. If we really love this country, we'll reject the poison of pride before it takes us all down with it.

Greatness requires more than slogans. It requires humility, courage, and a willingness to serve something bigger than ourselves. That's the America worth fighting for.
